## **Online Caregiver Support**



**Dan Bateman, MD**, is Assistant Professor of Psychiatry, Indiana University School of Medicine (IUSM), Scientist, Indiana University Center for Aging Research, Investigator, Regenstrief Institute, Inc. and Implementation Scientist, Center for Health Innovation and Implementation Science. Dr. Bateman's research interests are in Alzheimer's disease (AD), caregiver support for persons with dementia, implementation of best practices in dementia care, and use of technology to help older adults improve quality of life and maintain independence. *It is important not to lose sight of the person and their family when someone develops a brain illness.* Dr. Bateman works with persons with cognitive impairment, major neurocognitive disorders (dementia, AD), older adults with mental illness, and family caregivers. Helping patients and families navigate the complexities, treatment options, course and current medical understandings of neurocognitive disorders and mental illness are among the aspects of his work he finds are most rewarding. Improvement in how healthcare is delivered to older adults with brain illnesses is a focus of his research.

## **Healthy Aging Brain Technologies**



**Richard J. Holden, PhD**, is Assistant Professor of BioHealth Informatics at the Indiana University School of Informatics and Computing, Indianapolis, and Director of the Health Innovation Lab ([theInnovativeU.com/lab](http://theInnovativeU.com/lab)). He received a joint PhD in industrial engineering and psychology from the University of Wisconsin-Madison in 2009. Dr. Holden's research applies human factors engineering and psychology to study and improve the work performance of patients, informal caregivers, and clinicians using technologies that are usable, useful, and satisfying. He has participated in 13 grants from the National Institutes of Health, Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality, Patient Centered Outcomes Research Institute, and other federal agencies. Dr. Holden has authored over 90 scholarly works in the fields of human factors, patient safety and quality, health informatics, and research methods.
